






Meta L. Christy, DO 1820-1900


William G. Anderson, DO Born December 12, 1927





Jane Hinton VDM 1919-2003


 One of the first two African American women to earn a degree in veterinary medicine.

- Harvard University's first

- He created a blood test for diagnosing syphilis that was adopted by the U.S. Public Health Service.
- First Black person to write a medical textbook.
- Father of Dr. Jane Hinton.

- Dasia was named one of the top 40 finalists in the Regeneron Science Talent Search.


