What is your proudest accomplishment? My proudest accomplishment is my most recent work with Lane County Health and Human Services. I worked on a project examining refugee health for Afghan refugees receiving services from Lane County and was able to provide the department with a number of recommendations to immediately improve refugee health and support interpreter services.

What inspired you to pursue your health sciences career path? The thing that continues to inspire me to pursue health sciences is seeing people in pain who can be healed through medicine. Growing up, my mom had often been in pain but refused to seek treatment for her conditions because of a fear of medical procedures. I hope to help people feel more comfortable while they are being treated so they have more confidence to work with providers in the future.
