Western University of Health Sciences is an independent nonprofit health professions university founded in 1977, conferring graduate-level degrees in biotechnology and pharmaceutical sciences, dental medicine, medical sciences, nursing, optometry, osteopathic medicine, pharmacy, physical therapy, physician assistant studies, podiatric medicine, and veterinary medicine.



Meet WesternU Oregon

Western University of Health Sciences' venture into Oregon started with humble beginnings. In 2004, WesternU's College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific (COMP) developed a "Northwest Track" in which 30 students studied two years on the California campus, then returned to the Northwest for clinical rotations. The success of this program was immediate. By 2009, WesternU made it a focus to have a positive impact on the shortage of physicians in the Northwest by recruiting students from the Northwest, educating them in the Northwest, to practice in the Northwest.

In 2011, WesternU partnered with Samaritan Health Services (OR) to open the College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific-Northwest (COMP-Northwest), the state's first new medical school in more than 100 years.

WesternU embarked on further expansion in Oregon as a key part of the WesternU strategy to expand rural health education with the establishment of the College of Health Sciences-Northwest in July 2021.

Today, WesternU Oregon is home to 500 students pursuing doctoral programs in Osteopathic Medicine and Physical Therapy across two campuses. WesternU Oregon also provides community health care services through WesternU Health Oliver Station in Portland.

In 2025, WesternU announced that COMP-Northwest would transition to its new name, the Heatherington College of Osteopathic Medicine. The new name honors Jeff Heatherington and the Heatherington Foundation for Innovation and Education in Health Care. Heatherington is a leader, philanthropist and lifelong advocate for osteopathic medicine in Oregon. This is the first time in WesternU's 48-year history that a college site will be named for a major benefactor and advocate.

learning opportunities with community volunteers. Additionally, our service-learning component allows students to learn through hands-on experiences while giving back to the community. Interprofessional education, where students learn with, from, and about other professions, is threaded throughout the curriculum so students graduate ready to provide team-based care. Our entry-level curriculum is well-balanced so our students graduate as movement specialists who are prepared to meet the needs of patients across the lifespan and can thrive in the rural communities of the Pacific Northwest.

Pathways to a Career in Health Care

Health Career Ladder

WesternU Oregon's Health Career Ladder (HCL) offers a pathway for youth (PreK–12th grade) from the community to become skilled and compassionate health care practitioners choosing from a variety of health professions available on campus. HCL provides academic enrichment and mentorship to student participants, along with specialized presentations on academic resources and health education topics to their parents and guardians. The program also plays a vital role in promoting healthier lifestyles within our communities.

One such HCL pathway program is the annual Mini-Medical School activity. COMP-Northwest is proud to welcome local elementary school students to campus each year to participate in a series of activities related to medicine, health, and wellness. WesternU takes pride in our relationship with the community and the opportunity to encourage young learners in the community to explore the world of medicine.

WesternU Oregon is pleased to partner with the Area Health Education Center (AHEC) to provide a summer camp for local high school students interested in medicine. This camp, as part of the HCL pathway program, provides an immersive experience where students learn about various medical fields such as imaging, surgery, and research through hands-on activities.

In 2017, Student Affairs partnered with student leaders and designed the Dream program: a three-day summer program, to prepare, educate, and empower students who have a desire to be physicians. Beyond academic courses in anatomy and research, the program educates participants about admissions, residencies, and the matching process.



Academic Excellence

We promise our students that they will graduate from the University with the communication and scientific skills necessary to thrive in the modern health care system. They will develop a healthy sense of self, learn to understand and embrace all people, know how to continue learning throughout their careers, and cultivate a passion for promoting healing and wellness.

Outstanding Faculty

When we ask our students what they love about WesternU, their first and quickest response is almost always: the faculty. Not only do we pride ourselves on a supportive culture of faculty mentorship, we are proud of our distinguished

research and clinical faculty. Our exceptional faculty lead transformation in their fields and specialize in training adult learners to take their place on the front lines of their chosen specialty.

Standardized Patient Program

WesternU's professional Standardized Patients are trained to simulate the medical condition of an actual patient. Patients portray a detailed case of a current medical problem, past medical history, family and social situation, and emotional state likely in patients and their family members. They look for specific student responses and skills, record them, and give feedback to the students on their performance.

These safe and realistic environments provide students and community health care professionals rich opportunities to develop and hone their clinical, interpersonal, and communication skills.



"Sim labs are the most effective way to train somebody how to do medicine because it reinforces the learning you get in the classroom, decreases anxiety, and prolongs retention of that knowledge. Those lessons then shine in the real-world environment. Most people wouldn't want to fly with a pilot who did not practice on a simulator. The same is true for medical care."

The innovative learning space provides WesternU students with high-quality medical simulation experiences.

Entrepreneurship and innovation are part of our WesternU DNA, and we encourage lifelong learning and discovery for both faculty and students. We are building a distinctive WesternU research profile through the pursuit of excellence:

At CHS-Northwest and COMP-Northwest, faculty are leading research in a variety of areas, including trunk control impairments in adults, the evolution and ecology of pathogens, medical student wellness and burnout, and much more! Our faculty have an open-door policy and interested students are encouraged to join current projects or are supported in pursuing research in new arenas.

Biomedical Research

The Office of Research & Biotechnology offers faculty the opportunity to apply for funding in the form of seed grants and intramural/internal grants. In addition, we offer state-of-the art facilities and labs so that faculty and students can work side-by-side to advance knowledge in biotechnology with the ultimate goal of improving quality of life. Our renowned faculty are published in some of the most advanced medical journals worldwide.

Student Research

Students have the opportunity to work side-byside with other students and faculty members to pursue their research interests. Each year, students present their research at the annual WesternU Oregon Research Symposiums. The goal of WesternU research is to advance knowledge, create new knowledge, and ultimately to help patients and improve quality of life.







A Community of Belonging

Each of our WesternU colleges offers students the opportunity to engage directly with patients and community members. Students and faculty work side-by-side in volunteering to care for people in the community—seeing their patients in real-life situations and experiences. This allows our students to feel embedded in their communities and offers a diverse range of clinical experiences.

As part of our humanistic tradition, we encourage all students to participate in the community as a volunteer. Many students find ways to serve the community while simultaneously developing their medical knowledge. Students teach health and science activities at the local elementary schools, provide care to patients through the Linn County Medical Reserve, and connect with residents at the Oregon Veterans' Home in Lebanon. These opportunities, along with the countless other ways students serve in the community, help mold our students into compassionate, community-minded health care professionals.

Interdisciplinary Education

WesternU's Interprofessional Practice and Education (IPE) Program combines students from all eight WesternU California colleges, students from COMP-Northwest and CHS-Northwest, and nursing students from Linn-Benton Community College. Students from these different professions work together to open communication and awareness for patient-centered health care teams. IPE reviews community social determinants of health to improve community health, creates support systems and teaches different models of practice. It provides an opportunity for all medical professions to learn together to enhance collaboration and improve health outcomes for patients.

At the College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific-Northwest (COMP-Northwest), we are dedicated to preparing the next generation of osteopathic physicians who serve with purpose, passion, and proficiency. Our faculty and staff foster a student-centered, interprofessional approach to learning, with a meaningful emphasis on humanistic health care.

Rooted in a long-standing tradition of humanism, our Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine (DO) program trains compassionate, culturally sensitive, and highly skilled medical professionals. Osteopathic Medicine takes a whole-person approach, emphasizing the body's interconnectedness, and DOs are trained to use both traditional diagnostic and therapeutic techniques alongside Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine (OMM)—a hands-on approach that supports the body's ability to heal itself. Operating as "one college, two campuses" in Pomona, California, and Lebanon, Oregon, COMP and COMP-Northwest offer a comprehensive curriculum that includes both

preclinical and clinical phases, with diverse clinical rotation sites exposing students to a variety of specialties and care settings.

Recognized as a Tier 1 medical school by U.S. News and World Report, COMP-Northwest gives students the opportunity for early clinical exposure through voluntary tracks in areas such as rural health, chronic care, global health, lifestyle medicine, and applied anatomy. The program consistently achieves high board pass rates on the Comprehensive Osteopathic Medical Licensing Examination (COMLEX-USA) and boasts above-average residency placement rates, with students excelling in both primary care and a wide range of specialties.



Health science programs are offered in an environment intended to foster respect for the uniqueness of each and every patient. Students are provided with classroom and clinical experiences designed to prepare them to function as competent, caring, and nurturing health care practitioners.

College of Health Sciences-Northwest

At the College of Health Sciences-Northwest (CHS-Northwest), our physical therapy program is built on a foundation of humanism, where students are prepared to deliver person-centered care that fosters respect, empathy, and trust. Our blended learning curriculum combines in-class active learning with hands-on experience, focusing on problem-solving and evidence-based practice. Students engage in experiential labs where they practice real-life techniques with clients and patients, as well as service-learning opportunities that allow them to apply their skills while giving back to the community. From orthopedic and neurological rehabilitation to pediatric and geriatric care, our students are trained as movement specialists who can serve patients across the lifespan.

Clinical education is a cornerstone of our program, and students benefit from a wide range of clinical partnerships across the country. Through rotations in hospitals, private practices, and community health centers, students gain experience in diverse settings, including rural and medically underserved communities, preparing them to meet the region's unique health care needs. Our focus on rural health ensures students are well-prepared to excel in smaller, resource-limited environments, where they can have the greatest impact.

Academic Program

Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT)

Student research is another key element of our program, allowing students to engage in projects that contribute to the advancement of physical therapy practices. Working alongside faculty researchers, students explore areas such as biomechanics, rehabilitation techniques, and the integration of new technologies into patient care. Through research, students not only deepen their clinical knowledge but also contribute to the development of innovative, evidence-based approaches to physical therapy.

The program's success is reflected in our inaugural class of graduates, who are confident and competent practitioners entering physical therapy and related fields. Our alumni are prepared to excel in various settings, including community clinics, hospitals, private practices, the military, and educational institutions. With a commitment to ongoing professional development, they are well equipped to deliver innovative, patient-centered care across all environments.






WesternU Health Oliver Station

Oliver Station, located in southeast Portland, serves as a teaching facility through WesternU Health. Our WesternU Health doctors are dedicated to meeting the medical needs of our growing and diverse local communities.

WesternU students, alongside trained physicians, provide primary care and multi-specialty care with an appreciation of each patient as a person—a neighbor, a friend, a family member—rather than a diagnosis or a set of test results. Even as we bring modern diagnostic techniques and evidence-based treatment, we never lose focus on the humanity of each person who walks through our doors.



Oliver Station offers exceptional medical care at affordable rates, utilizing state-of-the-art equipment to deliver top-quality treatment. Patients benefit from the expertise of experienced and nationally-recognized doctors who dedicate ample time to ensure thorough and personalized care.



Practical Application Labs

For future health care professionals, hands-on experience and training is essential. Our Doctor of Physical Therapy students at WesternU Oregon engage directly with community volunteers through the Practical Application Labs program (PALs). PALs is a series of practical labs in which physical therapy students, under the direct supervision of an instructor, practice physical therapy techniques with volunteers. This experience allows them to apply concepts from the classroom while developing strong communication skills and professional conduct.

The PALs program is built into the scaffolding of our curriculum. Because of these early and frequent experiences, students graduate with the ability to engage with patients right away.

"My favorite part of PALs and working with the volunteer would have to be the participants that come each week. They are so welcoming and receptive that we are all students and that we may not have all the answers but are providing them with the best care we can offer. As a student, it makes it easier to ask questions or make a mistake because I know how much they care about us and helping us learn and grow."

Building the health sciences university of the future


